**First, you make ask, what is Summer Slide?**

Summer Slide is what happens when the skills students learn during the school year are lost or forgotten over the summer. When kids do not practice their reading skills during the summer months, they can fall behind by the time school starts again. Summer may be winding down, but it is not too late to polish up those reading skills in time for August!

**Why is it so important to prevent Summer Slide?**

When children do not read over the summer, they can fall two years behind by 5<sup>th</sup> grade. We believe that teamwork leads us to our goals so it is always important to support your child's learning at home, and over the summer is critical.

**How can I prevent Summer Slide?**

You can prevent the summer slide but making sure your child does the below assigned summer assignment for their grade level. Do not let your child wait until the last minute but read or do a portion of their assignment daily in order to keep their brains thinking.

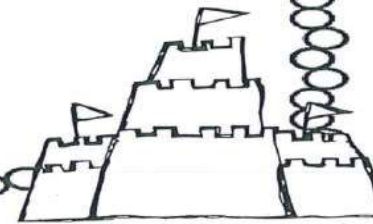
Dear Parents,















#### Please note:

- Yearly and monthly tuition is paid through the FACTS program. Monthly tuition is paid on the 20<sup>th</sup> of each month beginning in July. There is a \$36.00 annual Administration Fee charged by the FACTS Program.
- All scholarship award letters must be submitted by July 20<sup>th</sup> or you will be responsible for monthly payment.
- Any difference between scholarship awards and stated tuition is the responsibility of the parent/guardian. Families that are awarded 100% of Step Up for Students will be responsible for paying \$150.00 per student.
- Students with an Early Learning Coalition Child Eligibility Certificate will receive VPK credit for morning.
- St. Andrew also accepts School Readiness (4C). Parent fee set by School Readiness (4C) must be paid weekly.
- 8<sup>th</sup> Grade students will have a \$250 graduation fee added to their tuition and paid via the FACTS account based on their FACTS payment plan.

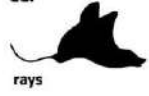
#### Preschool Lessons: Ages 3-5
